Lent and Giving Up...

At this writing we are entering the holy and penitential season of Lent. From Ash Wednesday to Easter are forty days (not counting Sundays) of repentance and preparation for the joy of Easter. For some, this may involve the act of giving up something so that daily, or many times through the day, they remind themselves of Christ's suffering, death, and ultimately His resurrection. Their giving up something should help them focus on Christ who gave up his life to pay the penalty for all of our sins. It might be giving up chocolate or some other pleasure that helps one remember the suffering of Christ. With this is also remembered the grace and mercy shown by God and the faith given to trust in Christ, freely repent of sins and receive forgiveness. The Lutheran church does not hold to the mandatory giving up of things or fasting during lent, but views doing so as within the freedom we have in Christ. We may personally do or not do this, and we should not look down on those that do or don't so as not to create a law either way. But, we are called to repent.

The first of Luther's Ninety-Five theses states, "When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said 'Repent' (Matt. 4:17), he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance." To Lutherans, repentance is part of our very existence as God's children and it is brought into greater focus as we observe and remember the passion and suffering of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ in the season of Lent. We see His humiliation in His incarnation and humble birth where He took on the form of our humanness and laid aside the glory and power that was His in heaven. He chose not to use it to save Himself but to glorify His Father in heaven. This glorification took place on the cross where, as eternal God, He gave up His life, defeating the power of the devil, so that we could have life eternally with Him through the power of His resurrection. This is by no power of our own. God sent His Son to have the sins of all men placed on Him. God's perfect law in the Ten Commandments shows us our sins and our total depravity and the gospel, the good news, shows us Christ who has taken the punishment we truly deserve. With faith in Christ and the atonement He has made for our sin, we are penitent and contrite about our sins and trust in the mercy and grace given to us in the forgiveness of our sins. The absolution we receive in the name of Christ Jesus.

On Ash Wednesday, as we begin Lent, you may have ashes placed on your forehead before the start of the service. The ashes are in remembrance that we are only dust and will return to dust. And, the sign of the cross they are applied in is a remembrance of our being made alive with Christ in our baptism, where our sins are forgiven, and we are given eternal life through the power of His resurrection. On the Last Day our dust will be gathered up again and our bodies given eternal life with God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. As Luther reminds us, our entire life as believers, is to be one of repentance. A life where we daily, with a contrite heart, confess our sins to God and have faith in the forgiveness God has freely given us through His Son. This gift of forgiveness, along with the gift of faith to believe it, allows us to be free to give up the one thing that Jesus tells us we must give up... "For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will save it." (Luke 24:5) As Christians, through the gift of faith in Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit, we give up our entire lives to Christ, not just a piece of our lives for forty days, and He saves our lives and makes them eternal.

A blessed Season of Lent to all of you!

From the Chairman

I hope all of you had a blessed Christmas as we celebrated Christ's birth.

I would like to take the opportunity to discuss with you a couple of items that could use fund raising support: Creating new altar paraments and repairing our hail damaged roof.

New Altar Paraments

We at Advent have been blessed to have beautiful paraments that; cover the altar; hang behind and on the pulpit and lectern; and are the veil over the chalice and paten that sit on the altar for the Lord's Supper. Time has taken its toll on them in the form of both wear and fading that has made the colors loose much of their original vibrancy.

Chris Colson, who designed the altar furnishing more than 25 years ago, has worked with Pastor Fiene and a seamstress to design and create new paraments that will edify our worship visually and glorify God for many years to come as we gather around His Word and Sacraments. These will be of a different style for the altar, more fitted without material flowing around the altar onto the floor. They will also allow for the base of the altar to be seen. Also, the wood hardware used to hang the banners will be replaced with wrought iron, better matching the other fixtures in the sanctuary.

We have a few thousand dollars in gifted funds in a dedicated account that are being used to help purchase the six sets of needed paraments in colors of gold, white, violet, green, red, and black. The cost of all the materials and labor is \$13,500 or \$2300 per set. A set consists of approximately ten different pieces. If you would like to make a donation to help with part or all of the cost of a set of paraments, you will find special envelopes on the round table in the narthex. If you are making a memorial contribution, please note that as well. While we do not have the practice of labeling and placing plaques on memorialized furnishing or other items, we will list the memorial contributions (not dollar amounts) in printed announcements when the paraments are dedicated for use. We will also record the memorial contributions in the church records.

The new paraments will freshen the sanctuary, chancel, and altar, pointing all who worship at Advent, for the next twenty plus years, to the honor, glory and praise given to our Lord for His abundant grace shown to us. We hope to be able to dedicate and begin using the new paraments at some point during the season of Lent.

Roof Repair

As many of you may already know, our roof received major hail damage on April 26, 2017. A claim was filed and after several reviews by adjustors, contractors and structural engineers, it was determined that roughly 50% needs repair. Damage was primarily sustained on the west and South slopes. The roof is approximately 20 years old, so we will

need to replace even the undamaged shingles sometime soon regardless. So for those who desire to look at this glass as half full, God is providing us a new roof for ½ the cost. From the glass half empty perspective; one can't help but recognize a complete roof replacement requires a substantial outlay in addition to the insurance settlement.

Here are the numbers:



Full roof replacement: \$128,565

Insurance settlement: \$ 59,747

Out of pocket expense: \$ 68,817 (if we choose to replace the whole roof)

This seems like a lot of money if you compare it to what it would take to replace your roof at home. Keep in mind, though, that the square footage is roughly 10 times greater. The council will need to decide in March whether to replace the entire roof or only half. Matching shingles can be challenging, so we will need to look at adjoining faces as one unit if we don't replace everything. We will be assessing our remaining budget, cash reserves, and any fund raising contributions before making a final decision.

As stated earlier, if you would like to contribute to either one or both of these projects, there are special envelopes in the Narthex area. Thanks for your prayerful consideration.

This grant attempts to help break the cycle of poverty and decreases the potential for abuse by housing women and children in a safe, caring and Christian environment. 

About the book

Piety has fallen on hard times. Some associate it with its evil twin, pietism, and reject piety based on the incorrect assumption that the two are one and the same. Pietism is inwardly focused, obsessed with carefully following spiritual to-do lists and rules. Piety, rather, fights against that inward focus, turning our attention out toward God and His promises and toward our neighbor in love and care. Piety is simply the cultivation of godly habits—habits that befit the household of God, the family of our heavenly Father. In *Thank, Praise, Serve, and Obey: Recover the Joys of Piety*, Martin Luther's small catechism and the Book of Concord serve as our trusty roadmaps as we explore how to properly hear in the Scriptures our heavenly Father summoning us to the joy and freedom of living and growing as His beloved children through Jesus Christ.
